

The Train Wreck.




A must stop is Vincent's Ice Cream Shop (our old-fashioned Parlor featuring a Rum Raison ice cream with Rum from Train



RBANA 9th Annual Poetry Competition 2024

The **Jack Hume Heather & Thistle Trophy** is awarded annually for writing poetry in the style of Robert Burns. Jack Hume, who passed away a few years ago, was the founder of the Heather & Thistle Burns Club and a staunch supporter of RBANA. This is the ninth year that the trophy will be presented for the competition and entries are invited under the following rules and conditions:

- Entries should be submitted by email to secretary@rbana.com
- The deadline for entries is **Sunday 31st March 2024**
- Poems submitted must be original, and not previously published.
- Only RBANA members in good standing are eligible to win the trophy.
- Entries from non-RBANA members will be judged by the panel but are not eligible to win the trophy.
- The winner will be chosen by a three-member panel, consisting of Steve Newman, Associate Professor in the English Department at Temple University, Jim McLaughlin, a frequent winner of the competition and member of Calgary Burns Club and the 2023 Jack Hume Trophy winner Jim Alexander from Atlanta, GA. Entries will be submitted to the panel anonymously, and the panel's decision will be final.
- The winner will be announced at the 2024 AGM and Conference in Mount Holly, New Jersey in May.
- This trophy is awarded annually, and the winner is responsible for returning the trophy to the RBANA Secretary or President prior to the following year AGM & Conference.

"Why We Still Read (and Sing!) Robert Burns" - On-line Course

Steve Newman, Associate Professor of English at Temple University and one of the judges of the RBANA Jack Hume Poetry Competition will be teaching an on-line course entitled "Why we still read (and sing!) Robert Burns." The course which is being hosted by the Rosenbach, will take place over four separate eve-

nings in February and March 2024.

Beginning with Burns' spectacular burst onto the scene in 1786, the first session will investigate the literary and political matrices that made it possible for this son of a short-lease farmer to become so celebrated, so quickly, though not entirely on his own terms.

The second session will focus on his love songs and bawdy songs, considering how Burns drew on and transformed tradition with lyrics on affection and lust and how codes of gender and sexuality informed them.

In the third session an examination of his interventions in the politics of the nation, as he presented himself as a "Bardie" licensed to



comment on a range of state and religious matters while navigating the electrifying disputes of his time. The fourth and final session will conclude with some of his master-pieces, including "Tam O'Shanter "and "Love and Liberty;" and the ways his work is circulated, celebrated, and critiqued by readers ranging from Walt Whitman to Frederick Douglass to Abraham

Lincoln to Maya Angelou; and how his work has become part of Scotland's reckoning with its role in the slave trade.

Along the way, time will be devoted to enjoying Burns, paying attention to his remarkable craft, the keen edge of his wit, and the wide range of his sympathy. So don't "gang agley." Join the program from the link below: https://rosenbach.org/events/why-we-still-read-and-sing-robert-burns/
